COLLECTIVE WORSHIP POLICY

Introduction

At St Andrew's CE Primary School we are committed to valuing and nurturing each child as an individual who will achieve their best and develop an enthusiasm for lifelong learning. Our vision is for the children in our school to grow into responsible, caring and fulfilled adults who actively and positively contribute to the society in which they live. We are committed to raising standards, values and self-esteem for all those involved with our school through cultivating a secure, yet exciting environment that is positive, supportive, stimulating and enriching.

As a Church of England Primary School we see our Collective Worship as a central part of school life. Our Collective Worship policy fulfils the statutory requirements common to all schools according to the 1988 Education Reform Act (and consolidated in the 1996 Education Act). It also fulfils the Diocesan requirements for a voluntary controlled church school which states that worship will be Christian in content with an Anglican emphasis.

Aims

Our aim is that our worship contributes to the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of all children and staff.

Our policy for Collective Worship supports this by:

Recognising that Collective Worship is an important opportunity to provide opportunities for our pupils' and staff spiritual, moral, social and cultural development

Providing a daily act of collective worship for all pupils which enables them to:

- worship God
- reflect on Christian values for schools, personal development, multi-faith festivals and

curriculum aptitudes

- develop a community spirit, a common ethos and shared values
- consider spiritual and moral issues
- respond to the worship offered
- respond to Christian language and symbolism and experience stillness and quiet

Ensuring Collective Worship, whether in assembly or class time, will:

- experience a variety of forms of prayer and meditation. These might include praise, seeking forgiveness or quiet reflection
- begin to understand the nature and purpose of worship
- Ensuring the daily act of collective worship be distinctly Christian in content and follows the liturgical calendar

be inspiring and transformational
be led by senior leaders, staff, children, clergy and visitors.
develop the Christian vision, values and ethos of the school and focus on our school Christian values
include a range of creative opportunities e.g music, silence, symbol, drama
celebrate and give thanks for the achievements within the school, local and international community and occasions of significance, including festivals
provide a foundation for a mature understanding and practice of worship in the future
will take place in the school hall, outdoors, in classrooms or the church
respecting the right of parents to withdraw their children for Collective Worship

Content of Daily worship

As a Church of England school the content of our worship is organised to:

- Follow a half termly, 3 year cycle to cover our 18 Christian Values
- Cover all the major Christians festivals including Harvest, Christmas, Easter and Pentecost.
- Be rooted in Bible teaching
- Use the school prayers, Lord's prayer and other prayers
- Be presented using a variety of styles and to include music, story, drama, enthusiastic singing, reflection and reverence in prayer time.

• Be linked to the SEAL programme

Special Services and Visitors

We value our links with the staff and congregation of St. Andrew's Church. We hold our Harvest, Remembrance Day, Christmas, Easter and Harvest services in church. The vicar regularly leads worship and always attends our services in the church. The PAIS team lead an assembly on a regular basis. Where possible we also invite other members of the community in to lead worship. All visitors are welcome to attend our Collective worship.

Inclusion and withdrawal

Collective worship is central to the life of the school. However, parents/carers do have a legal right to withdraw their children from all or part of worship. Before making the decision to exercise that right parents /carers are encouraged to discuss the issues with the principal. Staff also have the right to withdraw on grounds of conscience but we hope that all staff will feel able to support the Christian ethos of the school by participating in collective worship.

Monitoring, Evaluation and Review

The school will review this policy annually and assess its implementation and effectiveness. The policy will be promoted and implemented throughout the school

Time:

This assembly is planned with a termly theme based on the 18 values from Values for Life. It usually lasts for 15-20 minutes.

The assembly always begins with a welcome, a prayer and a hymn. The hymn is chosen to reflect the theme of the assembly.

Aims:

This assembly very much focusses on personal development.

As it is a whole school assembly we foster a corporate identity by asking all staff and children to be present.

The aim of the theme is to develop thought on topics beyond the "everyday" and enhance personal/spiritual growth by thinking about self and a specific value that can

permeate through their life and school life in general.

Balance:

There is often a link between Christian teaching from the Bible, celebration and festival and issues relating to spiritual, moral, social and cultural education.

The assemblies can be accessed by children of all ages.

At this assembly we stress that the school hall is like a church and it is a very special time in the school day.

Time:

The assembly always begins with a welcome and a prayer.

The assembly lasts for 15 minutes.

Develop knowledge of hymns for liturgy and assembly purposes.

To know that hymns can be themed or seasonal.

Balance:

This assembly is educational, inclusive and enjoyable.

The whole assembly becomes a time of worship in effect.

Wednesday - Whole School assembly - Clergy/Staff/PAIS Team Led

Time:

This assembly is planned with a termly theme. It usually lasts for 15-20 minutes. The assembly always begins with a welcome, a prayer and a hymn. The hymn is chosen to reflect the theme of the assembly and is chosen by Mr Lindop or Mrs Barnes.

Aim:

To maintain/strengthen links between the church/parish and school.

Children experience clergy and their teaching

To focus on aspects of the Bible.

To link bible stories to their own lives.

Balance:

Content is very much based on Bible stories

This is educational, inclusive and Mr Lindop makes it enjoyable.

As it is Mr Lindop there is a variety of Leadership

Mr Lindop plays his guitar so this is a different source of music than other assemblies and he teaches new songs and hymns to the children.

Thursday - Whole School/Class based - SEAL Assembly

Time:

The programme is carefully planned.

The themes for the year are:

- 1. New Beginnings
- 2. Getting On & Falling Out
- 3. Going for Goals
- 4. Good To Be Me
- 5. Relationships
- 6. Changes

There is also a short unit "Say No to Bullying?" which is used as/when necessary.

There is a whole school introduction to each unit.

The rest is class based and planned by the teachers.

There isn't a set time but 15 minutes is around the time allocation.

Aims:

- To develop positive relationships between student and student, and staff and student.
- To identify difficulties and provide strategies to overcome them.
- To provide positive experiences and reward students.

- To allow students to develop a sense of self.
- To foster a sense of ownership towards the school and all that is in it.
- To develop self-esteem and self-worth.
- To be effective and successful learners.
- To be self-motivated.
- To deal with and resolve conflict effectively and fairly.
- To solve problems with others or by themselves.
- To manage strong feelings such as frustration and anxiety.
- To recover from setbacks and persist in the face of difficulties.
- To work co-operatively.
- To respect the rights, beliefs and values different from their own.

Balance:

Issues relating to spiritual, moral, social and cultural education. Focus for worship depends on theme and class/age. Inclusive
